She digs safety

Call 811 before you dig this spring.

Whether it's a big project like a swimming pool or some new shrubs around your yard, make sure you call 811 before you grab the shovel! Your property may contain

underground utility lines. Knowing where utility lines are buried can help you avoid injury, service outages (and unhappy neighbors), and costly repairs.

Call 811 a few days prior to digging, and you'll be routed to your local 811 call center. Tell the operator where you'll be digging, what type of work you're doing and when. Within just a few days, local utility companies (like us) will visit your site and mark the location of any underground lines, free of charge.



Stay safe around downed power lines

When it comes to downed power lines, knowing what to do (and what not to do) can save your life. If you ever see a downed power line, follow these tips:

- Stay at least 30 feet away from the wire and any objects such as tree limbs. This is about the length of a regular school bus.
- Never drive over a power line that is on the road – the lines could be energized. Call 911 right way, and if possible, Liberty's emergency number 1-800-206-2300.
- If a downed power line is closer to you than 30 feet, shuffle step with your feet close together to inch your way away from the line or bunny hop with both feet together. You want to keep both feet in the same "voltage zone."
